Alberta Healthy Living Program with Alberta Health Service partnership ..clients can use our computers to get the services they need. Libraries and are trusted institutions in their communities. They are places people go to get information they know is reliable. They are places people go to meet other people, learn new things, engage with the institutions' collections, and to enjoy themselves and the company of others. These trusted community institutions function as a "third place" (or "third space") where people congregate outside of home or work in informal ways that build community.

In many places these institutions are stepping into gaps left by depleted, or absent, public sector supports for education, public health, and social services. The roles they are taking on to fill these gaps often stretch their organizational capacity and missions in an effort to address resident needs that have historically been served by the public sector.





## Indigenous Services



#### POP UP INDIGENOUS SERVICES

Due to Covid-19 restrictions, during 2021 the Pop-Up Library Service was provided only at the Cold Lake Native Friendship Centre from July 15th to September 16th. The other 2 locations (Cold Lake First Nations and Elizabeth Metis Settlement) still have not authorized to resume this service.


2021 Stats for the July- September period are : 82 items circulated, 54 visits of patrons, 9 memberships renewed and 16 In House items used during the 10 Pop Up Library Service Sessions offered at the Cold Lake Native Friendship Centre.

We have continued developing the Indigenous Collection by adding new titles in the Adult, Young Adult, Juvenile and Children's Collection. These items have been grouped in Polaris as Indigenous Collection and placed on display in their respective areas.

During 2021 we have been working on a project called : "A Tipi for Cold Lake Library". With this project we plan to create a welcoming and inclusive space at the Reading Garden of the South Branch where we will run programs for all ages inviting indigenous artists and knowledge keepers to share their art and traditions with members of our community and surrounding areas both Indigenous and Non-Indigenous. With the contribution of several organizations that are partnering with us, we have started working on this project by extending the Reading Garden to be able to accommodate the Tipi which we plan to install during the Spring of 2022. In order to raise the funds for this project, we presented 12 applications, 6 of them were approved, 2 were denied and we are currently waiting for an answer to 4 applications.



## One Month Snapshot September 2021 Social Media


