History & Laws

- Canada has not had a law similar to Americans with Disabilities Act
- Until recently building code and Provincial Law was depended upon
- Only three provinces have a law specifically for disabilities

ACCESSIBLE CANADA ACT

VISION PROACTIVELY ELIMINATE AND PREVENT BARRIERS AND ENSURE GREATER OPPORTUNITIES FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

MORE THAN **6 MILLION** CANADIANS AGED 15 AND OVER **HAVE A DISABILITY**

LESS THAN 60% OF THOSE AGED 25 TO 64 YEARS **HAVE JOBS**

CANADIANS WITH Milder DISABILITIES **EARN 12% LESS** AND THOSE WITH **MORE SEVERE DISABILITIES EARN 51% LESS** AND THEY ARE MORE LIKELY TO LIVE IN POVERTY

"NOTHING WITHOUT US": the Accessible Canada Act will be implemented in partnership with persons with disabilities and the disability community.

“The design of products, devices, services or environments for people who experience disabilities”



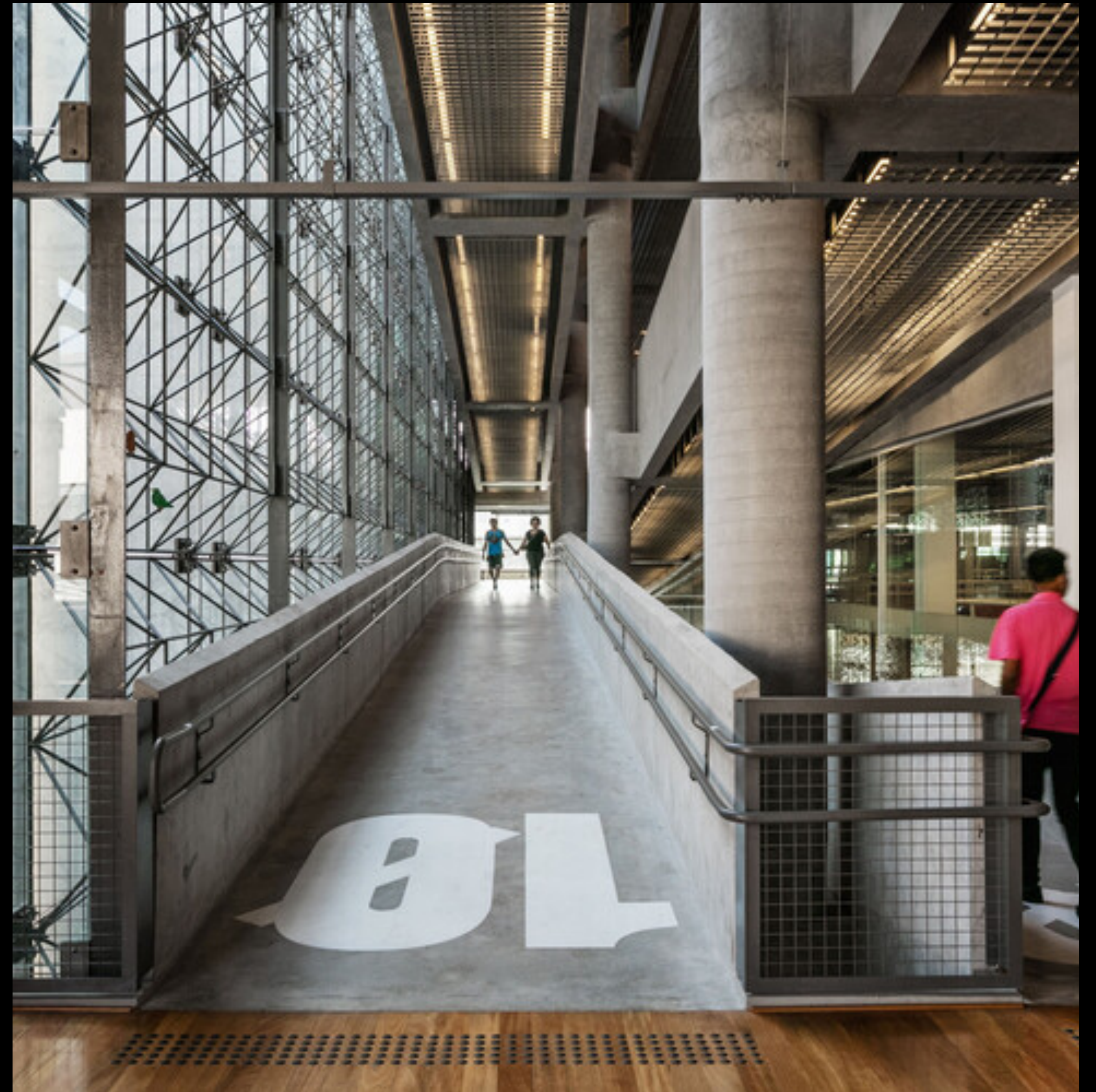
Meaningful Accessibility

“The ability for anyone, of physical ability, to independently and safely access the built environment based on planned inclusion”



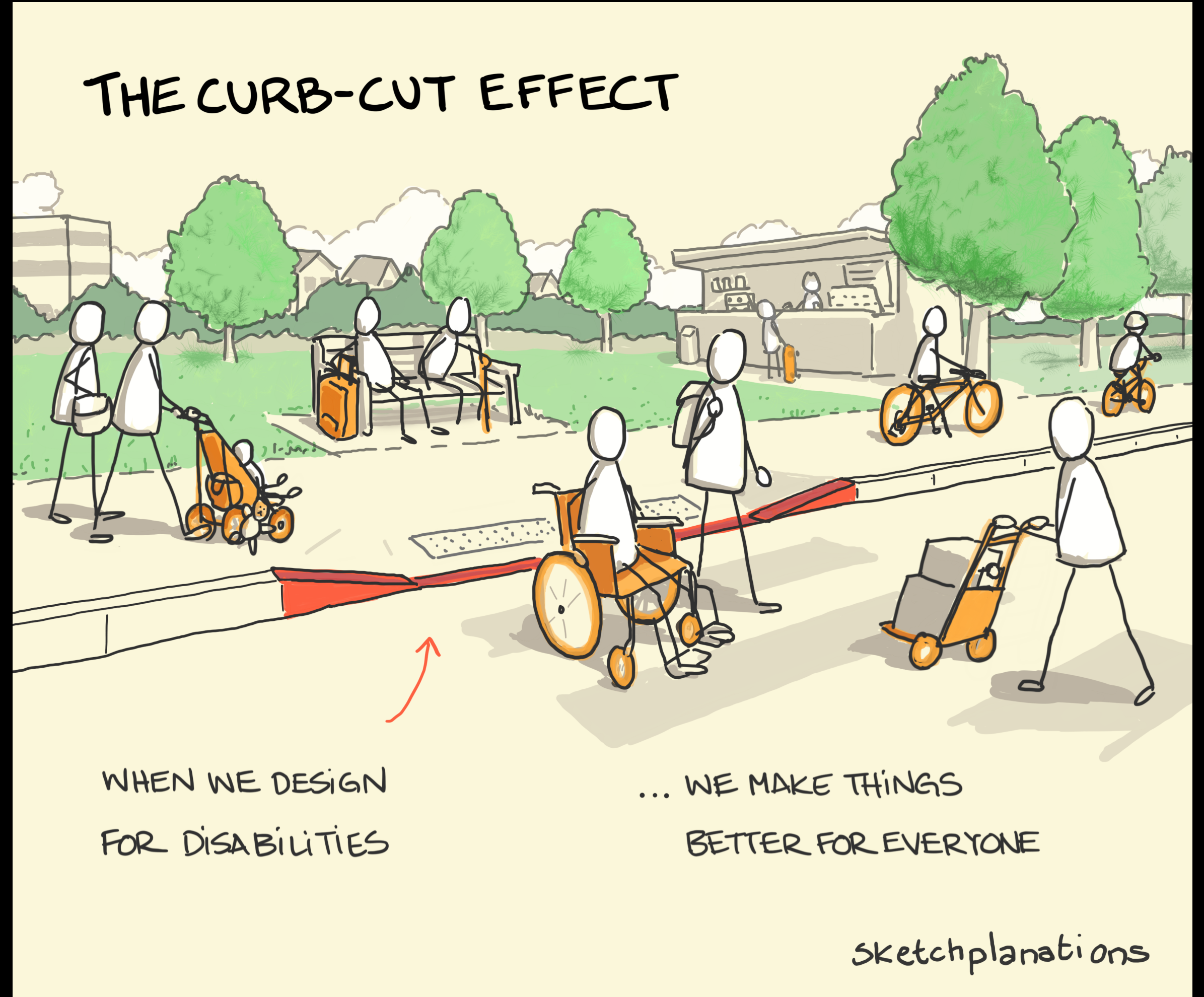
Universal Design

“the design and composition of an environment so that it can be accessed, understood and used to the greatest extent possible by all people regardless of their age, size, ability or disability”



Why now??

- Currently around 3.8 million or 1/7 live with a disability
- Within 20 years we can expect 9 million or 1/5 Canadians will live with a disability
- We are all only temporarily able bodied



Key Barriers

- Extensive curbs
- A lack of seating
- Little to no colour contrast
- Inoperable doors & threshold changes
- Very few accessible washrooms



Places to Start

- Add tactile warnings and color contrast to edges and level changes
- Install signage where needed
- Educate staff when needed
- Add seating intermittently alongside walks
- Create more parking spaces
