1. Alberta Emergency Services Medal (AESM)



Alberta Emergency Services Medal, (Provincial Medal - 12, 22, 32, 40).

The Alberta Emergency Services Medal (AESM) honours emergency services personnel who are involved in supporting emergency prevention, preparedness and response in Alberta, and who have committed 12, 22, 32, 40 years of service.

- 22 Year Bronze Bar - *Captain Phil Beaudoin* - All years with Cold Lake Fire-Rescue; (22 years of service, July 2002 to present).
- 22 Year Bronze Bar - *Captain Ken Isaacs* - All years with Cold Lake Fire-Rescue; (27 years of service, September 1997 to present).
- 22 Year Bronze Bar - *Lieutenant Gilles Manseau* - All years with Cold Lake Fire-Rescue; (22 years of service, July 2002 to present).
- 22 Year Bronze Bar - *Captain Sean McMillan* - All years with Cold Lake Fire-Rescue; (22 years of service, July 2002 to present).
- 32 Year Silver Bar - *Deputy Chief Norm Hollis* - 35 years of service. 4 Wing Fire Department (5 years) and Cold Lake Fire-Rescue; [Grand Centre Fire Department]; (November 1994 to present).
- 32 Year Silver Bar - *Deputy Chief Hugh McKay* - 33 years of service. All years with Cold Lake Fire-Rescue; [Grand Centre Fire Department]; (September 1991 to present).
- 40 Year Gold Bar - *Assistant (Station) Chief Doug Sirant* - 40 years of service. Barrhead Fire Department (8 years) and Cold Lake Fire-Rescue; [Grand Centre Fire Department]; (January 1993 to present).

2. King Charles III Coronation Medal



The King Charles III Coronation Medal is given to candidates who have made a significant contribution to Canada or to a particular province, territory, region or community of Canada, or have made an outstanding achievement abroad that brings credit to Canada.

- *Manager of Protective Services / Fire Chief Jeff Fallow* - All years with Cold Lake Fire-Rescue; [Grand Centre Fire Department]; (35 years of service, July 1989 to present).

Instructions

Part A

Please ensure the correct and complete spelling of the name, middle names are mandatory. In the absence of a middle name, enter N/A. Incomplete or inadequate nomination packages will be declined and returned to the nominator. The years of service must be indicated in full (month/year). The remaining information in Part A is necessary to avoid the risk of duplication; it will form part of the recipient's permanent file.

Part B

The nominator may be any member approved by the organization.

The nominator will be required to have the application reviewed and approved by the endorser. Self-nominations will not be accepted. Proof of the required time may be requested by Municipal Affairs Staff as part of the awards review process.

Part C

This section is completed by the endorser. It is the responsibility of the endorser to ensure the nominees meet the requirements for the AESM including required time and disciplinary reviews including all previous employers and is a member in good standing and currently employed with or has recently retired or has passed away.

The endorser is approving the names put forward by the nominator and is a person who has signing authority within the organization.

Part D

To be completed by the staff of Municipal Affairs.

Part E

The Comments section may be used by the nominator to indicate an extraordinary (including posthumous) nomination or by Municipal Affairs staff to explain why a nomination was rejected.

Approval Sequence

1. AESM nominations **MUST** be made by an authority for the nominating organization. Nomination form must be completed and signed electronically. Form submission via email at firecomm@gov.ab.ca.
2. Submissions received by Municipal Affairs require the Fire Commissioner's approval.
3. Medals and bars be sent to the nominator or awards committees for official presentation to the recipient.

Note: The Alberta Emergency Services Medal is intended, above all, to recognize the years of service of those who meet the eligibility criteria set out in the guidelines (<https://www.alberta.ca/alberta-emergency-services-medal>). Participating organizations cannot add or delete eligibility criteria; they must also ensure that the candidates' performance of duty involves potential risk, that they have the required number of years of service, and that they have service records to justify the awarding of the Medal (for example, that no serious disciplinary action has been taken against them.)

Guidelines

Alberta Emergency Services Medal (AESM) and Service Bars Policy

1. GENERAL

- a. The Alberta Emergency Services Medal (AESM) may be awarded to eligible personnel, as defined in Section 2 of this document, in accordance with these policy guidelines.

2. ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Personnel

- a. Individuals who serve in Alberta and are members of the organizations below who are involved in or directly supporting the prevention of, preparedness for and response to day-to-day emergencies are considered partners in the Alberta Emergency Services, including:
 - Firefighters (structural, industrial and wildland);
 - Emergency Medical Services (EMS) personnel, including paramedics (ACP & PCP) and emergency medical responders (EMR) as defined by the *Health Professions Act*, employed in public service;
 - Dispatchers employed in the public sector supporting emergency responders;
 - Any Police Officer as defined by the *Police Act* of Alberta;
 - Search and Rescue (SAR) personnel including SAR team volunteers;
 - Personnel from municipal emergency management agencies appointed under the *Emergency Management Act*;
 - Government of Alberta personnel involved in the prevention of, preparedness for, and response to day-to-day emergencies;
 - Correctional Officers as defined by the *Alberta Corrections Act* or the *Corrections and Conditional Release Act*;
 - Any Peace Officer as defined by the *Peace Officer Act* of Alberta;
 - Any officer, (Police, Auxiliary or Special Constable) as defined by the *Royal Canadian Mounted Police Act*, and whose accumulated total service time in Alberta meets the required period(s) of service.
- b. Partner organizations listed above may include public agencies, provincial, federal or municipal governments, SAR teams, and industrial responders.

- c. The personnel outlined in Section 2(a) above are eligible for the AESM, provided they have completed the required period of service as prescribed in Section 3 of this document.
- d. The AESM/Service bars may be awarded posthumously at the discretion of the Technical and Corporate Services on recommendation from the relevant Nominating Authority.

3. REQUIRED PERIODS OF SERVICE

a. AESM Medal (12 years)

Individuals are eligible for the AESM following twelve years of service in Alberta with one or more of the organizations designated in Section 2 above and:

- The individual must have been serving in a component of the Alberta Emergency Services on or after January 1, 2000;
- Service may be cumulative and need not be continuous provided all other eligibility requirements are met; and
- Cumulative service may include working within one or more of the approved services listed in Section 2(a) for a total of 12 years' service to Albertans.

b. Bronze Bar (22 years)

Individuals who have been awarded the AESM are eligible to receive a Bronze bar with rosette following at least twenty-two years' total service in the Alberta Emergency Services provided the criteria in Section 3(a) are met.

c. Silver Bar (32 years)

Individuals awarded the AESM are eligible to receive a Silver bar with rosette following at least thirty-two years' service in the Alberta Emergency Services provided the criteria in Section 3(a) are met.

d. Gold Bar (40 years)

Individuals awarded the AESM are eligible to receive a Gold bar with rosette following at least forty years' service in the Alberta Emergency Services provided the criteria in Section 3(a) are met.

4. NOMINATOR AND NOMINATING AUTHORITY

Nominator

- a. Persons serving in a particular discipline outlined in Section 2(a) above may nominate any of their peers or subordinates in that discipline. The Nominator is responsible for ensuring proposed recipients meet the eligibility criteria.
- b. Nominators must not be serving in a subordinate role/rank to that of the nominee. In situations where the chief official is eligible and a superior is unavailable to nominate, the nomination may be made by that person's immediate subordinate. This situation must be communicated to and approved by the Nominating Authority. Senior officials (Municipal CAOs, etc.) may nominate chief officials of their emergency response organizations.
- c. Self-nominations will not be accepted.

Nominating Authority

- d. The Nominating Authority is the entity responsible for the final approval of AESM nominations within their respective discipline and for maintaining the integrity of the AESM awards within that discipline.
- e. The Nominating Authority reviews nominations to ensure the Nominator has certified the information and eligibility prior to the approval.
- f. It is the responsibility of each Nominating Authority to ensure nominees meet the criteria in Section 2(a) and 3(a) above.
- g. A law enforcement and EMS representative will be assigned to Technical and Corporate Services to assist in the review and administration of the AESM.
- h. Nominating Authorities for the AES Medal/Service Bars include:
 - Alberta Municipal Affairs, Technical and Corporate Services: structural and industrial fire, search and rescue;
 - Alberta Agriculture and Forestry, Wildfire Management Branch: wildland fire fighters;
 - Alberta Health Services & Alberta College of Paramedics: emergency medical services personnel;
 - Calgary Police Services: Alberta police services, peace officers, sheriffs, corrections officers, commercial vehicle enforcement, fish and wildlife enforcement;
 - Alberta Environment and Parks, conservation officers and emergency response officers.

- i. Where no specific Nominating Authority is designated, the nominations will be reviewed and evaluated by Technical and Corporate Services.

5. ADMINISTRATION

- a. Technical and Corporate Services will:
 - Collect nominations, in a form and manner determined by Technical and Corporate Services, from time to time and direct them to the appropriate Nominating Authority for review and approval;
 - Upon receiving the approved nominations from the Nominating Authority, enter the approved nominees in the master database and issue the appropriate awards to the nominating agency;
 - Support the Nominating Authority in the review of complaints or concerns from persons questioning the validity of a nomination;
 - Notify a recipient of the need to return an award should it be discovered that the eligibility criteria was not met;
 - Maintain a master database containing the names of all recipients of the AESM.
- b. Nomination Authorities must maintain a record of approved nominations and awards issued and rescinded. Technical and Corporate Services may request for these records, to be provided in a specific format, from time to time, but not less than once per year. Awards records will be placed into the AESM provincial database as they are awarded.
- c. Administration of presentation ceremonies for the AESM are at the discretion of the Nominating Authority and nominating agencies will determine the manner used to present the AESM to their members.
- d. The nominating agency is responsible for presenting the AESM to recipients, and for any costs arising from the presentation of an AESM.
- e. The Government of Alberta is responsible for the costs of producing and distributing the medals to the nominating agency.

6. MINIATURES/RIBBONS

- a. Recipients may have miniatures or ribbons of the AESM and bars created at their expense to be worn according to the policies provided by their Nominating Authority from time to time.

7. ORDER OF PRECEDENCE AND POSITIONING OF SERVICE BARS

- a. The AESM may be worn in accord with the policy of the Nominating Authority. If the medal is worn on the left breast of the recipient, it must be worn in a position subordinate to any awards issued by the Crown in right of Canada.

- b. Service Bars are to be worn on an AESM ribbon in row from bottom up and to be arranged in order of precedence and positioned as following:
- A Bronze Bar (22 years) is to be positioned 1.9 cm above the AESM holder and to be first in row from bottom up;
 - A Silver Bar (32 years) is to be positioned right above the Bronze Bar with no space between the bars and to be second in row from bottom up;
 - A Gold Bar (40 years) is to be positioned right above the Silver Bar with no space between the bars and to be third and last one in row from bottom up.

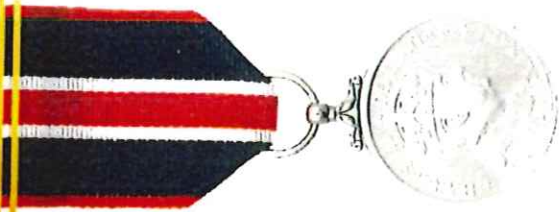
As a community partner in the King's Coronation Medal process, the CAFC selected nominated individuals who demonstrated current, sustained, and significant contributions to the fire service at the national level.

King Charles III Coronation Medal

The official description, eligibility, criteria, and history of King Charles III's Coronation Medal.

Eligibility and criteria

Eligible candidates must meet the following national criteria:

- Have made a significant contribution to Canada or to a particular province, territory, region or community of Canada, or have made an outstanding achievement abroad that brings credit to Canada, and
- Be alive on 6 May 2023. The award can be made posthumously, as long as the candidate was alive on that date.

The list of partners in this medal program and their allocation of medals have been confirmed. During the anniversary year, 30,000 medals will be awarded, of which 4,000 will recognize members of the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF).

To honour public service employees, medals have also been allocated to federal departments and agencies, including DND. Nominations will be made in accordance with the criteria above and using selection guidelines to ensure that recipients reflect the diversity of the department. The allocation of medals for public service employees within DND will be administered by the Corporate Awards and Recognition Team at ADM(HR-Civ).



Description

A circular medal, silver in colour and 32 mm in diameter, bearing:

- On the obverse, a crowned and robed effigy of His Majesty The King of Canada, facing right, circumscribed with the inscriptions "CHARLES III DEI GRATIA REX" and "CANADA".
- On the reverse, there appears on the background a ring of frosted triangular shapes evoking the image of a string of pennants displayed for a celebration. These 13 shapes allude to Canada's provinces and territories, and their circular arrangement conveys the idea of inclusion for all Canadians. The circle is also an important concept for many Indigenous Peoples, symbolizing not only equity but also the cycles of the natural world. Over this background appears the Canadian Royal Cypher in the center, the date of the Coronation, 6.V.2023, on the left and the words "VIVAT REX" meaning Long Live The King, on the right.

A 12 mm ring, which holds the ribbon, passes through a small hollow ball at the top of a claw joined to the top of the medal.

The ribbon is 32 mm in width with a red stripe in the centre, 5 mm in width, on each side of which are white stripes, 2 mm in width, followed by dark blue stripes, 9.5 mm in width, and red edge stripes, 2 mm in width. This ribbon is identical to the British Coronation Medal ribbon and is inspired by the King Edward VII's Coronation Medal ribbon from 1902, which was the first Coronation Medal suspended from a ribbon.

Bar(s)

There is no bar to this medal.

Wearing

The medal shall be worn in sequence prescribed in the Canadian Orders, Decorations and Medals Directive, and in the following manner: on the left breast, suspended from the ribbon described above, after the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal and before the RCMP Long Service and Good Conduct Medal.

Post-nominals

The use of a post-nominal is not authorized for this medal.

Historical notes

The medal program was first announced three days before the Coronation, on 3 May 2023, by the Prime Minister.

The design of the medal and the details of the program were announced by Rideau Hall on 6 May 2024, first anniversary of the Coronation.

The inaugural ceremony also took place on 6 May 2024, on which occasion the Governor General presented the first medals to the Lieutenant Governors and Territorial Commissioners during a virtual event. On the same day, some Lieutenant Governors also held inaugural presentations in their province, which included the first military recipients.

The medal was designed by Cathy Bursey-Sabourin, Fraser Herald at the Canadian Heraldic Authority at the Chancellery of Honours, Rideau Hall.

The medal is struck in nickel-silver and lacquered to prevent tarnishing. It is manufactured by the Royal Canadian Mint.
