Security Contract

During February, all services remained the same as the prior month's report, which included providing sixty (60) hours / week, (240 hours / month) of dedicated security services during both the day, evening, and late night / early morning hours. Daytime shifts are currently approximately 80 hours / month (33% of hours), and Evening / Night shifts are approximately 160 hours / month (66% of hours).

A monthly performance report is provided by Watchdog Security to clarify their interactions. The following table outlines the most reported information.
